What Human Resources Would Love For You to Know... ...But Can't Tell You

But don't worry, there are some things you can do. Try and contact

someone within the company, possibly someone that you know or are LinkedIn with, and ask: Is the hiring manager actively recruiting for this position? If you are able to get someone on the phone, keep it brief, and let them know exactly why you are calling. Get your answer, thank them, and hang up. Mission accomplished.

The objective is simple; get a response to your question, keep it brief, and be polite. You don't want to be remembered for being rude, so leave the person on the other end of the line with a good first impression, you never know if

you'll see, or hear from them again.

Even the receptionist is watching

There is one irrefutable truth when it comes to interviewing, everybody is interviewing you. From the time you enter the parking lot until the time you leave, everybody is watching.

According to the U.S. Census, workers 18 and over with a bachelors degree earn an average of \$51,206 a year, while those with a high school diploma earn only \$27,915.

The job market is a complex place where job availability is based on things like the overall working population, the number of individuals that are able to work, and demand for products and services that make those jobs possible. But what does this all mean to you, the student, as you contemplate the next four or five years of your undergraduate careers?

Healthcare & Social Assistance

Degree programs: Business, Social Sciences, Business Administration, And Behavioral Sciences

Education Services

Projected to grow 12 percent adding 1.7 million new jobs through 2018 in both the public and private sector. The reason for this growth: Student enrollment is on the rise in both sectors and the demand for advanced degrees will continue to grow.

Degree programs: Education, Business, Humanities, Social Sciences

Administrative & support and waste management & remediation services

Projected to grow by 18 percent by 2018. Employment services will experience the largest growth, making up 42 percent of all new jobs making it the 5th among all industries with the most new employment: The reason for this growth: Increasing demand for seasonal and temporary employment and the need for specialized human resources services.

Degree programs: Social Sciences, Business Administration, Behavioral Sciences, Engineering, Law



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4 WAYS To Prepare For An Internship Phone Interview

Setting yourself apart in today's job market means the difference between getting the career you've always wanted and spending all your energies trying to get the career you've always wanted. An internship is probably one of the best indicators of worker success which is why so many employers hire their interns. This article walks you through the first crucial step after you've applied for the internship; the phone interview.

There are four key steps in preparing for a telephone interview:

A. Research the company or agency:

- Check the Career Services Office (CSO) on your campus for recruitment brochures and other information.
- Look at the company or agency website. It is probably the best source of information about the organization, culture, products, services, and geographic locations.
- Talk to current or past employees or interns, if you know them.

B. Know what employers are looking for in employees:

It is important to know the knowledge, skills, and abilities that are desired in interns. They include:

- Adaptability; Flexibility
- Communication
- Creative Problem Solving
- Drive to Achieve
- Passion and Enthusiasm

C. Anticipate interview questions and prepare answers.

The following is a list of four questions you might encounter.

1. Tell me about yourself.
2. What are your strengths?
3. What is your greatest weakness? Or, in what area do you need the most improvement?
4. Why do you want to work here?

D. Prepare questions you have about the company and internship.

You may only have the opportunity to ask two or three questions during the interview. Here are some suggestions:

1. Have you had an intern in this position before? What made that person successful?
2. What qualities are you looking for in a candidate who fills this internship?
3. What are the department's top priorities and how are they measured?

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Remember:

- It isn't necessary to memorize potential interview questions. It is necessary to know what the company does, anticipate questions, and stay focused. When responding to the interviewers don't talk too much about things that do not matter. Answer the questions succinctly and make sure what you're saying is valuable.
- Interviewers want to know you can do the job, and be successful, so they want to determine:
 - Do you have the knowledge, skills and ability to do the internship?
 - Are you motivated to excel in the internship?
 - Can you get the job done? Will you know when you need help and how to ask for it?
 - Will you fit within the organization? Can you work on their team?

4 SKILLS For The Future Workplace
