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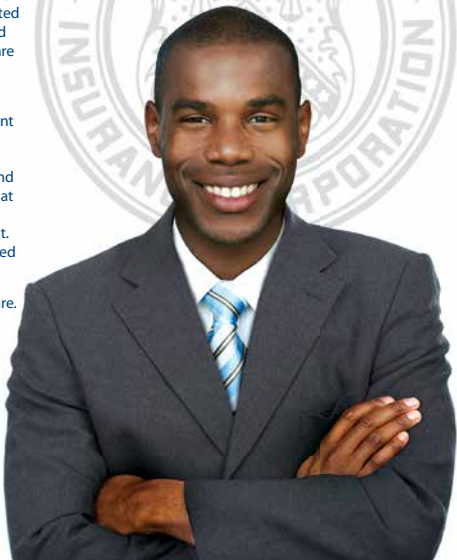
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LETTER FROM THE PUBLISHER

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TAKING YOUR RESUME TO THE NEXT LEVEL!

How do you write a resume to stand out and get an employer to call you?

HAVE AN OBJECTIVE

Help the resume reader understand what you really want!

Typical Objective: *Challenging job where I can use and enhance my skills in a business setting.*

Better Objective: *Compensation/Benefits Analyst position using my Human Resources experience and coursework to improve a company's bottom line.*

USE KEYWORDS

Corporate recruiters must use keywords to narrow down the candidate pool to a reasonable number. If you are missing related technical/functional words a real person may never find your resume.

USE NUMBERS TO SHOW RESULTS

Most resumes give a list of "tasks." I want to see results and numbers. For example, if a candidate sold smartphones:

*Sold phone to business users: **Sold \$5,000 of product every three months***

*Provided customer service: **Averaged sales of 110% of quota***

*Followed up on client prospects: **Achieved 95% satisfied client ratings***

LIST AWARDS/CERTIFICATIONS

Include all relevant awards and recognitions that you have received. If you would like to talk about them in a potential interview, and can still have the skills, include them on your resume.

Get your resume noticed, make your strengths clear, and hiring folks will call you!

Home to the nation's first collection of American art, the Smithsonian American Art Museum (SAAM) provides an unparalleled record of the American experience. Its galleries showcase works by such diverse luminaries as John Singleton Copley, Georgia O'Keeffe, William H. Johnson, and Luis Jiménez. The Renwick Gallery, located across from the White House, presents SAAM's collections of contemporary American craft.

For 50 years, in a continuing effort to broaden the museum field, the Smithsonian American Art Museum has offered two exceptional and innovative internship programs, training hundreds of students for successful museum careers both nationally and internationally.

THE ADVANCED LEVEL PROGRAM provides a comprehensive overview of museum operations. Participation is two semesters (fall and spring); 20 hours weekly. Extensive academic workshops accompany museum assignments. Participants receive individual career information and guidance. Some small stipends are available. **The application deadline is May 1 each year.**

THE SUMMER PROGRAM is for individuals with little museum experience. Participation is 8 weeks, 40 hours weekly, beginning mid-June. Students focus on one museum area related to their interests accompanied by selected workshops. This program is unpaid. **The application deadline is March 1 each year.**
